Willow Creek railroad fun for train lovers of all ages

In 2002, my first child was born. I clearly remember his first cries. I remember the perfect wrinkle of every toe. I remember simply being overjoyed. The first hour of his life, my husband and I marveled at the blessing.

Now in 2005, my husband and I sit together as our son runs circles around us. We spend about an hour trying to decide on a fitting location for a third birthday party.

"Our back yard?" my husband offers.

"Think bigger." I request.

"Disneyland?" he suggests with a smile.

"Too big," I judge.

"The park?" he tries once more.

"Not bad," I declare. "Now, if only we could find a park with a train."

Weeks later, I sit on a blanket under a beautiful willow tree. Bright yellow marigolds dot the edges of the grass. The breeze gently blows the tree branches from side to side and in the distance I hear a train whistle and a high pitched voice yelling, "Hi, Angela! Hi, Angela!"

Cradling my infant son, I rise to my feet and look down the nearby track as a miniature train rounds the bend. The engineer, complete in overalls and cap, is followed by my husband and 3-year-old son. Sitting behind them are several family friends, among them is one of my son's favorite playmates. She is waving and calling out to me.

I take this as a sign, a good sign. We definitely made the right choice for the location of our celebration.

I first discovered the Willow Creek Railroad at Antique Powerland online:

"Home of large scale model railroading since 1975," the Web site proclaimed. Looking closely at posted photographs, I could see adults and children smiling as they rode atop small boxcars.

I e-mailed the event coordinator and was put in touch with Garry, one of the original founders of this railroad and an engineer with a heart of gold. Speaking with him, I confirmed the location and hours of the train rides.

"The cost per person?" I inquired.

"No charge," he said. "Donations help the club with costs and improvements."

As the train chugs by me, all those aboard wave. The mainline track is more than a mile long and winds through the grass and trees, returning to the boarding area after an eight-minute ride.

Today, it is a WWCR Club member named Jack who graciously runs his train for us. He is patient as we line the kids up to take a picture before boarding. All total, the club has more than 30 engines and 100 box cars.

Jack's engine is painted a brilliant yellow and features a working headlight and five horns. The engine is about

6 feet long and is hooked to five boxcars followed by a detailed caboose. Each boxcar has two adjustable bench seats.

My husband takes the back seat and positions our son right in front of him. Their box car is marked 'Great Northern.' I also spy a 'Northern Pacific.'

The entire Willow Creek Railroad is one-eighth scale; meaning that every actual foot has been reduced to an inch and a half model. A small water tower, a brick train station, signals and railroad crossings stand among the track and

landscaping. All the smells, sights and sounds of early steam and diesel railroading are here, only smaller than the originals.

As we leave, I thank Garry and Jack for treating our family and friends to such a fun afternoon.

"We're here every Sunday if you want to come back and ride again," Garry tells me.

I also find out that the club will host large parties.

For only \$75, a group of 50 can enjoy the space for up to three hours. Unlimited train rides and picnic tables are provided. A gas grill and volleyball net can be requested as well. It's a great deal for a church group, family reunion, large birthday party or company picnic.

The Willow Creek Railroad Club has transformed a simple farm field into a tree-lined park area with a working railroad that provides fun for all ages.

What started as a modeling hobby has grown into a family attraction for the Mid-Willamette Valley.

I hope more families will stop by next Sunday and take a ride.

If they do, I hope they leave a generous tip in the red 'donation' caboose at the track entrance to thank these train enthusiasts for sharing their time and talents.
