Storm Clean-up

As reported in the winter issue, we had a great deal of storm damage during the first months of the new year. Before any of our ongoing projects could get underway we had to address all the debris. Several hearty members came out with stocking caps and chain saws and made firewood out of the fallen trees. Some of the trees that had not been uprooted were pulled upright and staked in hopes they would be ok when the ground firmed up? Once the ground firmed up another work party proceeded to remove the stumps and roots so work on Coyote Ridge could take place.

Coyote Ridge

Named for the home railroad of Dick and Rita Hofsheier, Coyote Ridge saw a real transformation this year. Last year phase one took place, installing a small water feature and more dirt to the area between Gillespie Forest and the track. This year Dick and his tractor got busy on phase two. The first task was, to place two dump truck loads of large boulders, creating a wall along the trackside of the ridge. Dick had a great crew helping and by the end of the day they had placed all the rocks and topped them off with several loads of dirt. The next task was to plant 33 Rhododendrons that Dick had purchased from a "Farmer Friend". Once these were in place a drip irrigation system was installed to keep them watered. A fresh layer of bark was put on top and Presto! What a huge visual improvement this made. So you are thinking Coyote Ridge is complete? Wrong! Plans for next spring include the planting of a ground cover and increasing the size of the waterfall feature.

The Ridge is a multi-purpose project, the most obvious is to screen the tent camping area and provide a nice view from both sides. Since our railroad is built on flat farmland, the Ridge in conjunction with the arborvitaes along the fence provides a feeling of traveling through a cut.

The ride is more interesting now and the reason for the signals has become obvious. This great improvement, sparked many positive comments from riders.

Thank you Dick, Rita for your donation of time and materials and to the crew that helped you. This shows what a little positive effort can accomplish.

"Trivia Fact"... Coyote Ridge now stands on the mainline of the previous layout.

Saturday we rolled in to Salem for the event. The PRPA also had our concessions trailer and the Operation Lifesaver trailer in Salem at the event as well. 
